The Rules and Regulations herein promulgated shall become effective only after notice of enactment of the same has been published in three consecutive issues of the university newspaper and in a newspaper having a general circulation in the county and municipality where a University of Southern Mississippi campus or teaching/research site is located. Such notice shall state where the full text of such rules and regulations may be found on file. In addition, such rules and regulations shall be posted on five bulletin boards at the campuses/sites of the University for a period of four weeks after their promulgation (Miss. Code Ann. § 37-105-3).

These rules and regulations are enacted by the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning, State of Mississippi, and effective from and after August 1, 2023. ## University Forum dates announced

The guest speakers for this fall's University Forum series at the University of Southern Mississippi are equal parts passionate and fearless in the work of their callings, whether in the fields of science or politics.

Presenters for the series, titled "Dare to Disagree," include Dr. Jamil Zaki, a noted Stanford University psychology professor who writes about the need for more empathy; Adam Kinzinger, one of only two Republicans in the U.S. House of Representatives to serve on its Jan. 6 Committee investigating the U.S. Capitol riot in 2021; and Dr. Jay Hakes, an energy policy expert with a long record of service in federal and state government.

Forum events will take place at Bennett Auditorium on the USM Hattiesburg campus, except for the Hakes presentation, which will be held at the Fleming Education Center on the university's Gulf Park campus in Long Beach and live-streamed at Bennett Auditorium.

"This year's University Forum reminds us that the personal is always political," said Dr. Andrew Haley, director of University Forum and a professor of history. "Whether scientist or politician, each presenter draws on their experience to confront new challenges, both individual and global. As University Forum nears its 50th anniversary of bringing provocative speakers to Southern Miss, we invite followers of our programming to join us in conversations certain to challenge how you see yourself and the world."

The program schedule is as follows:

— Zaki, "The War for Kindness," scheduled for 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 12. Hakes is director of Stanford's Social Neuroscience Laboratory and a collaborating scientist with its Center for Compassion and Altruism Research and Education.

— Kinzinger, "An Evening with Adam Kinzinger," scheduled for 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 10. Kinzinger is a former U.S. representative and an active member of the Air Nation-

al Guard. He will soon publish an autobiography, "My Life in Faith, the Military, and Defending America from Trump's Attack on Democracy."

— Hakes, "Biggest Resilience Challenge: 20-Year Strategy on Climate Change," scheduled for 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 14. Hakes was admin-

istrator of the U.S. Energy Information Administration and served for 13 years as director of the Jimmy Carter Presidential Library.

Walk under trees, in the shade, or pass through buildings to avoid being overheated by the sun. Carry a bottle of water with you at all times so you can stay hydrated in the heat.

Hydration is key during the dangerous heat. You can drink things like Gatorade or Powerade to stay hydrated, but water is always important and should be on hand constantly. Caffeine and alcoholic beverages can contribute to dehydration if taken in consumption. Lower your caffeine intake during this time, and make sure you're drinking enough water.

Always wear sunscreen so you can avoid painful sunburns and keep your skin healthy in the long run. Try to wear broad-spectrum sunscreen of 15, but 30 to 50 would be better for sunburn prevention.

Try to wear lightweight or loose-fitting clothes. Heavy clothes such as hoodies or thick blue jeans can put you at a high risk for heat-related illness and can cause weakness.

If you begin feeling weak in the heat, take a moment and recompose yourself. Drink water slowly, rest for a minute in the shade, and then see how you feel. If you begin feeling too

weak or dizzy, visit Moffitt Health at Century Park South to receive proper care. You can also take cold showers or baths to cool down in your dorm or apartment.

The hottest part of the day during this time is usually 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. The sun beats down during this time, meaning that heat exhaustion and sunburns are much more common. During this time, stay indoors as much as you can. This is easy for us students as we are usually inside during this time anyway!

Rest is of the utmost importance. If you must participate in outdoor activities (which can be unavoidable for some), carry a wet towel or a rag to wipe your face or to keep cool.

One of the funnest remedies during this time is swimming. Luckily for those at USM, the Payne Center has the M.C. Johnson Natatorium available for people to cool off in. The pool opens at 6 a.m. until 8 a.m. Monday through Friday for lap swimming. The pool reopens for more lap swimming from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Lap swimming continues from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m., when the pool closes. On Wednesdays, an aqua boot camp is available from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. On weekends, the pool is open for recreational and lap swimming from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. The natatorium is not only fun and great for exercise, but a wonderful resource

## Wiles to be starting quarterback; first game is Saturday

Southern Miss head coach Will Hall recently announced at practice that Clemson transfer Billy Wiles will be the starting quarterback for the Golden Eagles this season.

"We are going to name Billy Wiles

as the starter. Two things have been evident to me throughout this fall camp. One, Holman and Billy are both really good players, good leaders, and we can win with both of them. And two, Billy has been

better; he's just been a little bit better." Hall said.

This announcement comes after a tight quarterback battle in fall camp between Wiles and Houston transfer Holman Edwards. Hall had stated back at Sun Belt media days that the battle was between those two players. All throughout fall camp, these two players have been going back and forth in one of the tighter QB races that Hall and company has seen in his tenure.

But Hall made it clear that Wiles won the job because he was just a fraction better than Edwards. He didn't have to be light years better, but just a bit better to win back the job, and he did that. Hall made it clear that both players were really good, but Wiles just won the job. He couldn't go wrong with a player, but he had to choose one.

"Holman is a really good football player. Billy has just been a little bit better, and he has done some things better, so he's going to be the starter moving forward, and we will roll with that." Hall said.

Hall has always touted that the player that will win the job is the one that will be able to run his offense the best. Obviously, this may seem like a no-brainer, but Hall hasn't been able to use his style of offense practically at all in the two years he has been here. Because of that, the decision rested on the sort of "game manager" player that can last a full season. Hall believes that that job and idea have been won by Mr. Wiles.

"Yeah, I mean, it's exciting," Wiles said on winning the job. "Little less than two weeks until our first game, so I'm just excited to go and compete with everybody. It was a really fun competition, and I'm happy we are here and the season is ready to go."

Coming into fall camp, Edwards seemed to be in the lead, especially with Wiles playing through an oblique injury. So, the job needed to be won by Wiles coming into fall camp, but not only be won but taken from Edwards. Throughout all of fall camp, that seemed to be what aligned at practice.

Wiles looked more comfortable in the pocket and was definitely more consistent, making easy completions over the middle. Edwards is more of your big play creator. He will be able to spot a beautiful deep ball down the field a lot better than Wiles can. However, there are times he just made mistakes that cost drives, and Wiles made fewer of those errors.

The QB with the cleaner play is the pick here, and Hall didn't shy away. Hall did mention there was not a specific moment that Wiles won the job during camp, but rather a more complete showing out of all of fall camp from Wiles.

"I never thought there was a moment [Wiles won the job], because I wanted to let it play out. I wanted to scrimmage twice. I wanted every practice to matter, and I think they did. I think they were both really good, I just think Billy was a little bit better. And I know he was a little bit better consistently." Hall said.

That's why Wiles was named the QB, he was just a little bit better, but more importantly, just a little bit more consistent, exactly what Hall needs in a quarterback with his offense.

Not to mention that Hall goes back with Wiles all the way back to the days at Tulane when he recruited him back when Hall was there.

So, he has known Wiles and watched him play for a long time, and when Wiles announced he was coming to Southern Miss, it almost seemed like a formality he would start at quarterback. But, good for both Edwards and Wiles, they pushed each other to be even better than they might have been had there been now competition.

Now with the starting QB being named for Southern Miss, Hall can move forward with a central approach to running the offense with one guy. One guy, one leader: Billy Wiles

"Let's go. Let's compete. Let's win a lot of ball games and go chase the Sun Belt," Wiles said.

Southern Miss opens the season on September 3 against Alcorn State.

Southern Miss football is just days away, and the time for season projections is here. This article will review every game on Southern Miss's schedule and give score projections.

Week 1: vs. Alcorn State When: September 2, 2023 Where: Hattiesburg, MS When: 6 PM CT Watch: ESPN+

The Golden Eagles will open the season at home for the second straight season when they welcome the in-state foe Alcorn State. The Braves are supposed to be very talented this season, being picked to finish second in the SWAC Western Division.

Alcorn State landed six players on the SWAC preseason team, including five in the first team.

This is not your casual FCS opponent; the Braves are an experienced ball club competing tightly in their respective league. Southern Miss leads the all-time series 3-0, with Alcorn State not challenging them outside of the 2014 game, where Southern Miss squeaked by 26-20.

This game will be the first look at recently announced starting quarterback Billy Wiles, and it might take him a couple of drives to settle in.

This game could be close in the first quarter, but expect Southern Miss to blow it open afterward.

Prediction: Southern Miss 45-17 Record: 1-0, 0-0 in Sun Belt

Week 2: at No. 8 Florida State When: September 9, 2023 Where: Tallahassee, FL When: 7:30 PM CT Watch: ACC Network

It is only week two, but Southern Miss already is facing the gaunt-let of their demanding schedule.

Going on the road, under the lights, against a top ten team in Florida State in the AP poll will be a tall task. The last time Southern Miss played in a game on this level would have been in 2021 against Alabama, where they lost 63-14.

Florida State will have just been coming off one of the more anticipated week one matchups against LSU. If the Seminoles were to lose that game, that would almost certainly knock them out of the top ten, but still an excellent football team.

This will be a game that Southern Miss will go and try to compete as best they can, but try to avoid injuries to star players and enjoy the moment and compete to the best of your ability.

However, barring a miracle, Southern Miss will take its first loss to the hands of the Noles.

Prediction: Florida State 59-10 Record: 1-1, 0-0 in Sun Belt

Week 3: vs No. 24 Tulane When: September 16, 2023 Where: Hattiesburg, MS When: 3 PM CT Watch: ESPNU

After the game at Florida State, the path does not get any easier for Southern Miss. They return home and welcome the Green Wave of Tulane, who is coming off one of if not the greatest, season in Tulane history after going 11-2 and winning the Cotton Bowl.

The Green Wave and the Golden Eagles fought each other last season in the battle of the bell, with Southern Miss arguably getting their best win of Will Hall's tenure by winning 27-24. This year, Tulane returns star quarterback Michael Pratt and several key players around the team.

Southern Miss will be two games into a brand-new quarterback and coming off a rough week in Tallahassee. Look for them to be energized and ready to play the Green Wave. I think Tulane is a better football club, and they will seek revenge for last year's anomaly defeat. It is a close game, but I am taking a proven quarterback over an unproven quarterback.

Prediction: Tulane 31-28 Record: 1-2, 0-0 in Sun Belt

Week 4: at Arkansas State When: September 23, 2023 Where: Jonesboro, Arkansas When: TBA Watch: TBA

After two rigid back-to-back losses, Southern Miss will go on the road for the second straight year for the Sun Belt opener against the Arkansas State Red Wolves. Last season, this game was controlled by Arkansas State for most of the contest until Southern Miss got new life from quarterback Jake Lange, and he led a rally to help Southern Miss squeak by 20-19.

This season, Southern Miss should have better quarterback play than last season. The Golden Eagles also match up very well against the Red Wolves in this game; they should be more experienced in every area, especially defensively. The Red Wolves will be starting a new quarterback, and even though they are at home, I have Southern Miss coming out of Jonesboro with a win.

Prediction: Southern Miss 30-20 Record: 2-2, 1-0 in Sun Belt

Week 5: vs Texas State When: September 30, 2023 Where: Hattiesburg, MS When: TBA Watch: TBA

A game that got lost in the shuffle from last season was on October 22 in San Marcos, Texas, where freshman quarterback Zach Wilcke heaved a hail mary deep to Chandler Pittman. Moreover, it was caught, Pittman scored, and Southern Miss got out of San Marcos by the skin of their teeth.

Southern Miss gets an all-new look at Texas State in Hattiesburg this year. The Bobcats have an all-new head coach, G.J. Kinne, coming from Incarnate Word, where he turned that program around in his one-year stint. He took UIW all the way to the FCS semifinals and is no stranger to the FBS with coaching jobs at SMU, Hawaii, and UCF, among others. Kinne has a talented roster, and the Bobcats will be better than some people give them credit.

However, they will not be good enough to come into the Rock and knock off the Golden Eagles but expect this game to be close.

Prediction: Southern Miss 31-24 Record: 3-2, 2-0 in the Sun Belt

Week 6: vs. Old Dominion (Homecoming) When: October 7, 2023 Where: Hattiesburg, MS When: TBA Watch: TBA

It is the first meeting since 2016 and only the second meeting all-time (Series tied 1-1). Old Dominion qualified for a bowl in 2021 after starting 1-6! Last year, in 2022, Old Dominion had 17 returning starters and upset Virginia Tech in the opener. They almost beat Virginia a couple of weeks later and destroyed Coastal Carolina on the road 49-21. So this is a big surprise team, where sometimes they play well, sometimes they dont.

This year, the Monarchs return just seven starters, so they are a very inexperienced team, and they will be coming to Hattiesburg in what is most likely to be a night game on homecoming. That will be too big of a task for Ricky Rahne's Monarchs. Expect this one to be sured up by halftime.

Prediction: Southern Miss 31-10 Record: 4-2, 3-0 in Sun Belt

Week 7: at South Alabama When: October 17, 2023 Where: Hattiesburg, MS When: 6:30 PM CT Watch: ESPN2

This might be the game of the Sun Belt thus far in the season. Southern Miss and South Alabama both should be undefeated in the Sun Belt play. This will be a battle for the rights to a tie-breaker in the Sun Belt West. Last season, the game was very close for most of the contest until South Alabama eventually pulled away in the end.

The Jaguars are touted to be the Sun Belt's best shot in years to get to a New Year's Six bowl outside of Coastal Carolina in 2020. In head coach Kane Wommack's first year, the Jaguars failed to reach a bowl. Last season, they returned 16 starters, were just a point away from upsetting UCLA, and lost to Troy at home. They were just four points from going undefeated in the regular season last year. This year they have a whopping 18 returning starters and have the best defensive lines in the Sun Belt.

This game is a weird Tuesday night primetime on ESPN2. I think Southern Miss has vastly improved from last season to this season, but I also think the Jaguars have vastly improved to an even bigger level. Southern Miss has yet to beat South Alabama in football, which does not change this year.

Prediction: South Alabama 35-20 Record: 4-3, 3-1 in Sun Belt

Week 8: at Appalachian State When: October 28, 2023 Where: Boone, NC When: TBA Watch: TBA

The road gets more challenging after South Alabama. Will Hall must take his Golden Eagles up to Boone, NC to face Appalachian State. App State became a staple team in the beginning weeks of college football. After losing to North Carolina 63-61 in the opener, they upset Texas A&M at Kyle Field in College Station.

After that miracle, they pulled off another miracle with a hail mary against Troy while College Gameday was there in Boone. They fell off after that, and did not reach a bowl game even while going 6-6.

This season, they return eleven starters and draw Coastal Carolina and Marshall at home, where they have been brutal to opponents. They have been 43-6 at home in the last eight years. Southern Miss will have an extra few days to prepare for this game, but will not be able to get the job done in a tough road matchup.

After two challenging road games, Southern Miss returns to Hattiesburg to take on ULM. Last season, Southern Miss had to travel to Monroe and beat ULM to reach a bowl game for the first time in the Will Hall era. Behind Frank Gore Jr.'s exceptional performance, the Golden Eagles broke through and won 20-10.

Warhawk head coach Terry Bowden always could win, and in his first season with the Warhawks, he even sprung some upsets. They were in so many close games last season, seemingly dropping every one of them. This season, they lost their QB, RB, and top three WR's.

This should be a comfortable bounce-back victory for Southern Miss.

Southern Miss will play Louisiana on a Thursday night in primetime for the second straight season. Last year, Southern Miss won 39-24 and never lost the lead. This year, the game will be in Lafayette and will likely be pivotal for both squads trying to stay alive in the Sun Belt West.

This is a series that dates back to 1923, with Southern Miss leading the all-time series 41-11. They have won the last ten matchups with the Ragin Cajuns. This season, they have

just nine returning starters and draw South Alabama and Troy on the road.

In hindsight, I think Southern Miss has improved since last season, playing a better Lousiana team last year. I think Southern Miss goes to Lafeyette and gets the job done.

They only return one starter on the defensive line, so that I would give the edge to the Southern Miss offensive line. Their secondary was depleted, with only one player back who started last season. The offense is the strength of the team, but not the defense.

## Women's soccer secures first win

At the 70-minute mark, midfielder Adaira Nakano scored an unassisted goal, making the score 2-1 in favor of the Golden Eagles.

This goal marked Nakano's first of the season.

Devilettes struggled with getting opportunities at the goal line due to the outstanding defense of the Golden Eagles, only having three shot opportunities during the second period. The defense carried the team for the rest of the game.

"The objective of today's game was to control the ball, move the ball, and switch points of attack to get in between the teeth of the defense. We hope to build off this win and carry it into their next game versus Northwestern State." El-Zare said.


The Golden Eagles improved to 1-2 on the season.

## Defense poised to dominate

With a dominant defensive line, overwhelming linebackers, and a backfield of DBs that sent two players to the NFL, it will be hard to top the 2022 Southern Miss Defense. This season, the Golden Eagles are returning seven players on the defense, and the positions that did lose starting players got reloaded in the transfer portal and recruited to be poised to match or potentially surpass last year's defense.

This front seven is stacked. The defensive line is set to be among the best in the Sun Belt. With stars like Quentin Bivens, Jalen Williams, Josh Ratcliff, and Kristin Booth, the big guys are strong, domineering, and very mature. The linebacker core is a testament to how deep and dangerous this roster has become. Star Linebackers Swayze Bozeman and Hayes Maples both went down on

injury last year, and some real studs took their place and developed into their own. Bozeman and Maples join TQ Newsome, Jalil Clemons, Josh Carr, and transfer addition Kolbe Cage. The linebacker room did take a hit, losing veteran Averie Habas to an undisclosed injury. Two seasons ago, losing someone like Habas would have sent the defense into a spiral, but this year, they have two or three other members at the JACK position who could quickly get the start on any other Sun Belt team. Expect this front seven to be among the best, if not the best, in the conference and potentially in the entire Group of Five.

Down the field is where question marks lie, but do not take that as there is a lack of talent or potential. Stars like Malik Shorts, Natrone Brooks, Jay Stanley, and Eric Scott Jr. dominated any opponent's passing game. Three stars are gone, leaving Stanley as the sole veteran out deep. However,

there are plenty of players that have gotten meaningful game time. As Head Coach Will Hall pointed out, Brendan Toles and Michael Carraway Jr. played "meaningful minutes" in the 4th Quarter of the Tulane game last year. Look for them to come into their own and fill the void left by the three veterans lost last year. Helping fill that gap some more are two transfers who will be making an immediate impact: MJ Daniels and

Dylan Lawrence. Daniels is a corner-back out of Ole Miss who is incredibly talented and has earned a starting job throughout spring and fall camp. Lawrence is a safety out of Mississippi State and an absolute beast. At 6'5", he is the most physically imposing player in the backfield, and his speed and athleticism are far greater than someone his height ought to be.

One of the biggest things that has been overlooked, though, is the transition from Austin Armstrong to Dan O'Brien

Promoting from within is one of the better things seen in College Athletics, and to see Southern Miss doing just that is great to watch as a fan and encouraging to see as a player. O'Brien's style is very similar to Armstrong's; the main difference is a change in terminology, which will make the transition seamless for players and assistant coaches.

Expect a very similar defense.

## Golden Eagles ready to face Alcorn

Southern Miss is set to host the Alcorn State Braves to open the 2023 football season. This is the first time in four seasons that Southern Miss will open with an FCS foe. The last time was in 2019 when Southern Miss beat Alcorn State 38-10.

The Braves were picked second in the preseason media poll to win their division of the SWAC and look to dethrone Jackson State in the race for the SWAC title. Last season, Alcorn State posted a 5-6 record, losing to Jackson State by 11 points in their final game. They also played the same opponent that Southern Miss did in Tulane, losing that matchup 52-0. Of course, Southern Miss would beat Tulane 27-24.

Last season, Alcorn State averaged just 20.7 points per game and accumulated only 27 touchdowns through their eleven games. They do not score the ball much, but they play good defense.

The Braves are playing in the tough SWAC west division in 2023, which last year saw four separate teams having



a chance to win the crown in the final weeks. The Southern Jaguars eventually clinched the division after beating Grambling State. This year will see no change in the tightness of the race in the SWAC west, and the Braves have a great shot at coming on top. Southern Miss head coach Will Hall has said that he thinks and picks that Alcorn will win their respective division and potentially even the SWAC.

Alcorn State made the most significant roster shuffle in the SWAC after grabbing Tyler Macon out of the transfer portal from Missouri. Macon was a former four-star recruit and one of the top quarterbacks in the 2021 class. He was ranked as the 13th-best dual-threat quarterback by Rivals.com and 247Sports.com. Macon had offers from multiple universities, including Michigan State, UCLA, and Illinois.

Unfortunately for Macon, he did not see much playing time at Missouri. He played a handful of snaps in 2021 and none in 2022. After 2022, he entered the transfer portal and landed at Alcorn State. He might be the best quarterback the Braves have had facing Southern Miss in their history.

The Braves also welcome their All-SWAC running back, Jarveon Howard, who netted 1,270 yards and 12 touchdowns in his 2022 campaign. The rest of the Braves team might be more straightforward for Southern Miss to match up against, but this quarter-back-running back duo will be very similar, if not just as good, to the Sun Belt teams that Southern Miss will face this season.

"We're going down there to win a ball game. We're not going down there to show up and collect a check. It's not just a game." Alcron State head coach Fred McNair told WLBT in Jackson. This is no Northwestern State from last season; this team could win the SWAC with a former four-star recruit with the reigns taking the snaps. The Braves will give Southern Miss all they can handle, and it would not be a shock if this game looked a lot like it did in 2019, where Southern Miss only led 10-0 at halftime.

Southern Miss and Alcorn State have met three times, with Southern Miss leading the series 3-0. The closest Alcorn State came to beating Southern Miss was in 2014, where they lost 26-20 but were driving to take the lead in the final moments.

It has been 36 years since Southern Miss last to a non-FBS program, Louisiana-Monroe, back when they were not a part of the FBS. Ironically, they now are in the Sun Belt with Southern Miss. I do not expect Alcorn State to end that streak. This game might be close at halftime, but the star power on offense for Southern Miss will be too much for the Braves to keep up. USM will blow this open in the second half.

## Paul outlines yearly priorities

University president Dr. Joe Paul sat down with the Southern Miss Student Media Center to discuss his plans for the new school year.

Class is back in session at the University of Southern Mississippi. And the university's administration is working to face unique challenges. Enrollment has been declining for years, for a number of complex reasons. There are concerns about improving diversity amongst the faculty and the student body. And the recent Supreme Court decisions on affirmative action and student loan debt may complicate issues around diversity and affordability for students.

Read below for Paul's plans on diversity, administrative changes, and more.

#### What are your goals for this year and how will recent hires like Lance Nail and Kelly Lucas help you achieve them?

"Well, I'm excited about this academic year. We are showing some growth in freshman and sophomores [enrollment]. Really glad to have that top team together. So the goals for this year are to continue to grow our enrollment both undergraduate, graduate, and at Gulf Park; to maintain and enhance our Carnegie Research 1 status; and to continue on the path of upward achievement in private fundraising and athletic fundraising. All of those things while kind of onboarding and pulling that top team together. Over the summer we brought on Dr. Kelly Lucas as Vice President of Research, Dr. Lance Nail as Provost and Senior Vice President of Academic Affairs, and Dr. Kristi Motter as our new Vice President of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management. So integrating those folks together, pulling together that vision around growth for Southern Miss. We're still really focused on enhancing the quality of student life for all of our students as we raise those private dollars to give us some margin for excellence. So that's what we're up to here and I'm excited about it."

## Can you tell me more about this "top team," who is on it and what the purpose is?

"Yes. So it was very important to me - you know I started last summer as interim president and then in November was named president of the university. So I knew in January that I needed to build that top team. It's absolutely essential to growth. So Dr. Lance Nail comes to us Provost and Senior Vice President of Academic Affairs. He's the number two officer in the institution, and he's over all of the academic affairs...so all the academic offerings, all of that reports to Lance. Lance comes to us with some history at Southern Miss because he'd served as Dean of Business about twelve years ago. But then he had experiences at four other major universities, so he brings both an understanding of our culture and he's seen things done in other and sometimes better ways. He is a high energy leader. He is student-centered. He is very data-driven, very analytical, so that's a great



strength for my team. A lot of those characteristics are gonna be true of the other two as well. Dr. Kelly Lucas will head our research enterprise. When I say maintain and enhance our Carnegie R1 status, it's all about the funded research of our faculty and that's Dr. Lucas' job. She is another high-energy person. She's a legitimate ocean scientist, so she's done research at the highest level. She's worked on capitol hill, on the legislative side, so she knows where appropriations come from. She's worked in private industry and in education. So again, another tremendous asset. And then Dr. Kristi Motter, who was here working under me many years ago nine and a half or ten - as an associate VP, left here and went to [University of] Alabama [in] Huntsville as Vice President of Student Services and Enrollment there, where she helped grow the freshman enrollment by 36% in a five-year period, and now she's back again. She understands our culture, she's very data-driven, analytical, high-energy, and she's gonna help us enhance student life and grow our undergraduate student enrollment."

#### You said something about enrollment numbers improving. Can you give some specific numbers and can you name if some strategies that you had implemented have worked?

"Sure. We won't know our total enrollment numbers until much later in the semester. But what we do know is that we've got 5% more new freshmen this year than last, and that's very positive, because it's in a marketplace of a declining number of high school graduates.

And we've got a 5% increase in new transfer students, mostly community college students. I know that our efforts last year, the energy that we poured into it, our investment in scholarships - I visited sixteen high schools last year and twelve community colleges, and I hope some of that had a positive impact. But the best has yet to come in terms of really fine-tuning the strategy for growth for Southern Miss."

Do you have any goals to make

#### attendance more affordable for students?

"Yes. The reality of it is that even though our state legislature was very generous to us last year, that running this enterprise becomes more and more dependent on student tuition. One of the things that I plan to launch this fall is a private fundraising campaign for a \$30 million endowment for leadership scholarships to recruit students who want to be engaged and become involved at Southern Miss. When that \$30 million is realized, that will be 50 scholarships a year for new freshmen at \$3000 a semester, fall and spring, and that will continue for them for four years. So that's one way that we can bring in students and deter the cost for them while continuing to see the university grow."

## The Supreme Court recently ruled that affirmative action in college decisions is unconstitutional. How does that impact your goal to make the campus more diverse?

"I don't see that it will have an adverse impact. So to be clear, they ruled that you can't use race in making admissions decisions for students or graduate students. It does not affect the affirmative action federal laws and equal employment opportunity laws with our employees - with our faculty and our staff. We, in our admissions policies, have never made race preferences, and yet we enjoy the most diverse student body in the state of Mississippi. So we're gonna continue to grow, continue to be diverse, and it shouldn't have any impact on us because it doesn't cause us to change any of our processes."

#### Earlier this summer, State Auditor Shad White raised some concerns about university spending on DEI initiatives. What is your take on that?

"Well it's an interesting phenomenon. He did ask for an audit to what we were spending, which we fully complied with. I believe that investing in programs for students, faculty, and staff that increase our diversity, that ensure that all are being treated equitably, and that we really not just

create a climate of tolerance, but a climate of celebration, is essential to the life of the university. So we will continue to work in that direction."

# Forbes recently ranked USM as Mississippi's 6th best employer. What factors do you think contributed to this ranking and what message does this ranking send to USM's students?

"Well, we certainly were glad to learn that yet again we were named as a top place to work for employees in Mississippi. I hope it has to do with our culture. At Southern Miss, we attract people that want to go big places, that hold audacious dreams and pursue those with passion and persistence. I think we also have a community of caring, and so I think folks look out for one another. We're on a beautiful block of land. And I think one of the things that makes Southern Miss such a great place to work is how great our students are. They come to us, they're earnest, they're engaged, they wanna better themselves, and that makes for a great place to work. You can go home at night knowing you're making an impact that's gonna last a lifetime."

## You're known as one of the most active university presidents out there. What keeps you going?

"I love what I do! You know, I think the whole reason for higher education is to help students earn a great living, but create an extraordinary life. And so if you take a student - maybe they're a first-generation college student, and their parents or grandparents didn't have that opportunity and then they earn that degree, you change that person's life, but you change generations going forward, right? There's a lot of purpose to it, right? And there's a lot of gratification that comes from knowing that you're helping individual students, you're helping families, you're helping communities, you're helping the globe. So what keeps me going is I love Southern Miss."
